# EGLE announces Michigan Coastal Management Program's Creating a Culture of Resilience Capacity Building 2023 Grant Awards, round one

The Michigan Department of Environment, Great Lakes, and Energy (EGLE) announced today more than \$465,089 in Creating a Culture of Resilience Capacity Building Grant Awards.

These funds will lead to 11 grant-supported projects that help coastal communities increase their knowledge of coastal risks by providing capacity to conduct outreach, obtain technical assistance, create resilient plans and frameworks, and offer training workshops on actions that lead coastal communities to be resilient-ready.

Here are the recipients of the Creating a Culture of Resilience Capacity Building 2023 Grant Awards:

- City of Detroit Economic Development Corp.: \$25,750 to create plans to develop a 3.9-acre public park incorporating nature-based solutions on publicly owned vacant land adjacent to the Detroit River in the Jefferson Village subdivision.
- Emmet County: \$20,048 to host educational meetings with Lake Michigan property owners in all coastal townships within Emmet County and review county ordinance standards for coastal resilience.
- Harrison Charter Township: \$30,000 to update its master plan to incorporate principles identified in its 2022 Sustainability Assessment conducted by the <u>Land</u> <u>Information Access Association</u> through the <u>Resilient Michigan Program</u>.
- Huron Pines: \$100,000 to continue its ongoing efforts on the Lake Huron Forever Initiative by conducting peer-to-peer learning circles, developing user guides for coastal resilience action plans, assisting two communities with the development and adoption of the <u>Lake Huron Forever Pledge</u>, and providing community assistance and funding proposal development.
- Land Information Access Association: \$75,000 to continue the Resilient Michigan Program by assisting coastal communities to build resilience principles into their master plans and policies.
- Macomb County Planning and Economic Development: \$33,599 to update the Urban Forestry Road Map for Macomb County and create individual community tree canopy profiles for the 27 communities within the county.
- Michigan Association of Planning: \$13,307 to organize three Michigan Coastal Management Program (MCMP) Coastal Leadership Academy Scenario-Based Planning and Zoning training workshops in the Upper Peninsula.

- City of New Baltimore: \$52,803 to develop preliminary planning and engineering designs for a naturalized shoreline to replace an existing vertical seawall at Walter and Mary Burke Park located along Anchor Bay in Lake St. Clair.
- Southwest Michigan Planning Commission: \$50,800 to assist Benton Harbor with creating a green stormwater infrastructure framework and host public education events to promote resiliency concepts in the city of Bridgman, along with zoning ordinance review.
- Superior Watershed Partnership: \$48,944 to assist Upper Peninsula coastal communities and tribes with increasing resilience to coastal hazards through a survey, field inventories, technical assistance, and grant writing.
- Tip of the Mitt Watershed Council: \$14,837 to host two MCMP Coastal Leadership Academy workshops, develop a story map for the Little Black River Watershed, update existing permit guides, and host a Charlevoix County Planners Forum.

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

The Michigan Chapter, North American Lake Management Society is excited to announce its next in person Lunch and Learn event. The topic will be on Wake Boats, and we'll have guest speakers, Joe Nohner, Inland Lakes Habitat Analyst & Midwest Glacial Lakes Partnership Coordinator, Michigan Department of Natural Resources, Nicki Polan, Executive Director, Michigan Boating Industries Association; Ethan Hellier, Midwest Government Affairs Manager, Water Sports Industry Association and Jesse McArdell, Policy and Engagement Manager, National Marine Manufacturers Association to talk about their perspectives on Wake Boats on inland lakes.

Wake boats are powerboats specially designed to increase wave height for watersports, such as surfing or tubing. Their popularity and sales have soared over the last decade. Several studies on wake boats and their effects on inland lakes have identified issues ranging from damage to shorelines, piers, and docks to hazardous conditions for swimmers and small non-motorized craft. Recently the Michigan DNR Fisheries Division released a report on voluntary best operating practices in support of the continued use of wake boats while minimizing the effects on natural resources and near shore property. The Michigan Boating Industries Association has publicized Wake Responsibilities through flyers, handouts, and signage and provided guidelines for operation of

these vessels. Each speaker will discuss their agency's or organization's perspectives on wake boats and recommendations to minimize impacts.

Registration is now open, and can be made on this website or through mail.

Cost to attend which includes lunch is \$30; \$20 for full-time students. Seating capacity is limited to 80.

Registration deadline is Monday, November 20, 2023.

## Michigan Clean Boats, Clean Waters grant applications now open!

\$35,000 is available for Michigan organizations dedicated to aquatic invasive species education and outreach.

For the fourth year running, the Michigan Clean Boats, Clean Waters program has grant funding available to support aquatic invasive species outreach efforts. This opportunity is for Michigan organizations dedicated to the protection of our waterways including lake associations, local units of government, and non-profit organizations. This year, up to \$35,000 is available to engage the Michigan boating community in invasive species prevention actions.

Funding requests can be up to \$3,000 each and do not require local match or cost sharing. Clean Boats, Clean Waters grants can be used for a variety of activities including signage, invasive species supplies such as plant removal tools, sponges and towels, and staff time to perform watercraft inspections and demonstrations of boat cleaning techniques. Eligible applicants include lake associations, watershed groups, local or tribal units of government and non-profits. Cooperative Invasive Species Management Areas (CISMAs) and organizations with a statewide impact are highly encouraged to support local groups or pursue Michigan Invasive Species Grant Program funds to perform boater outreach activities.

Interested groups can apply for a grant now on the <u>Clean Boats, Clean Waters</u> <u>website.</u> The deadline to apply is January 19, 2024. This is a competitive funding opportunity and complete applications will be ranked based on group eligibility, project significance, anticipated outcomes, and target audiences. Accepted grantees will be notified in March of their award.

Over the last three years Clean Boats, Clean Waters has awarded 31 grants to lake associations, watershed groups, high schools, local units of government, and nonprofit organizations to educate the public about aquatic invasive species. Below are some examples of their projects.

- The Elk-Skegemog Lakes Association, located at the tripoint of Antrim, Grand
  Traverse, and Kalkaska Counties, installed Clean Boats, Clean Waters
  Decontamination Station signs and distributed education materials around Elk and
  Skegemog Lakes. The lake association hosted invasive species education events
  and partnered with the Tip of the Mitt Watershed Council to host boat washing
  demonstrations.
- The Alger Conservation District, in partnership with the Lake to Lake Cooperative Invasive Species Management Area and Burt and Au Train Townships, installed interpretive signs at public boat and kayak launches on the Au Train River and at the Burt Township Marina. In addition, a Clean Boats, Clean Waters Decontamination Station sign was installed at the marina for residents and visitors. The Conservation District and partners also hosted outreach events to educate the public about relevant invasive species and conducted boat and kayak decontamination demonstrations.
- The Kalkaska Conservation District partnered with Coldsprings Township and Manistee Lake Association to install a Clean Boats, Clean Waters Decontamination Station sign and display educational messaging near the boat launch at Manistee Lake Sands Park. In addition, the Conservation District sponsored paid advertising about clean boating practices in local media and hosted outreach events during busy weekends.

#### Michigan Clean Boats, Clean Waters Program


Michigan State University Extension is leading the effort to implement the Clean Boats, Clean Waters program in cooperation with the Michigan Department of Environment, Great Lakes and Energy. Since 2006 the Clean Boats, Clean Waters program has been educating Michigan boaters about aquatic invasive species with trained volunteer boat inspectors. The program has grown into a comprehensive aquatic invasive species boater outreach program thanks to funding from the Michigan Department of Environment, Great Lakes, and Energy. Clean Boats, Clean Waters promotes understanding of boat cleaning practices and regulations through the distribution of educational materials, an online

<u>resource library</u>, <u>boat washing demonstrations</u>, <u>grants</u>, and partnerships. The program builds upon existing partnerships with statewide and local organizations including the Michigan Lakes and Streams Association, CISMAs, and lake associations and is actively seeking new opportunities and partners to share the clean, drain, dry message.

## MSU Extension's popular Introduction to Lakes Online course is back this January

From lakefront property owners to local government officials, this course has something for everyone. Over 1,800 people have participated in the class since it was first offered in 2015 and we'd love to see this number grow.

Course topics include lake ecology, watershed management, shoreline protection, aquatic plants, Michigan water law, and community engagement. Each topic is explored via video lectures, interactive activities, discussion forums, and additional learning resources. We also host three live Ask-an-Expert webinars featuring experts from Michigan State University, the Michigan Department of Natural Resources, and the Michigan Department of Environment, Great Lakes, and Energy.

This year the course will kickoff on January 30, 2024. Registration is open until January 28. The cost is \$115 per person. Register by January 12 for an early bird price of \$95 per person. Scholarships are available.

We hire professional lobbyists - Karoub Associates - who understand the intricacies of dealing with state government - to reach out to our legislators. As you might imagine, the cost of hiring a professional, highly respected Lansing-based lobbying firm whose downtown Lansing office's are located within a literal stone's throw of Michigan's state capitol building is expensive - we believe, however, that to have someone in constant contact with our state senators and representatives it is more than worth the significant ongoing expense.

To put it in blunt "no ifs, ands, or buts" terms, without **YOU** generous support we will be unable to continue our erstwhile efforts in Lansing.

Please also remember that with the exception of a few relatively minor expenses related to keeping our website updated, and on-line, and a few relatively minor costs associated with distributing our e-newsletter, all of our membership and donation derived income goes to paying our downtown Lansing-based lobbying firm, and our attorneys. No exorbitant employee salaries or fringe benefit packages to pay!!!!!!!!

It is also important to note that last year **Michigan Waterfront Alliance** lawyers took a case all the way to the Michigan Supreme Court in order to get the State of Michigan to do it's job in protecting our lakes, rivers, streams, and wetlands.





<u>Must You Find Another Shrubbery? Understanding the Impacts of Invasive Box Tree Mothin Michigan</u>

Box tree moth (*Cydalima perspectalis*) was first detected in Michigan in fall 2022. This invasive pest, native to East Asia, poses a major threat to the boxwood plant, an ornamental shrub that is a valuable part of the U.S. (and Michigan) nursery and horticultural industry. Join Susie lott, MDARD invasive species program specialist, to learn more about identification, impacts and the state's response to limit the spread of this invasive pest.
